An Outline of the Picture

There are a thousand ways of telling any story and each of them can be perfectly valid. I have chosen a particular story to use as the framework for discussing contemporary disease and the new remedies. It is a coherent story and one that has been of use to me in arranging themes and symptoms. However, it is just one of many possibilities. It goes something like this:

The primary effect of the dissolution of boundaries is that **connection** can be made without obstruction or interference.

However, without defining boundaries for ourselves and others we have no regulated way of interacting and become lost in an infinite space. Connection becomes **disconnection** and isolation. Without connection there is no reason to care and this leads to a feeling of **indifference**.

Without boundaries there is nothing to contain and define. This results in **dispersion**, and an emphasis on the elements of air and water which are those that will disperse if not contained.

Instability, a tendency to go to **extremes** and **confusion** are all consequences of dispersion, and of a world in which there are no boundaries.

Air and water are feminine elements and there is a tendency towards passivity and **feminization** to be seen in society and in symptoms.

One of the functions of boundaries is to act as a protective shell. The removal of that protective shell leads to a sense of **vulnerability**.

A sensitivity to **infection and a lack of confidence**, or even a sense of shame and self hatred, are natural consequences of feeling vulnerable and unprotected.

Finally issues around **boundaries** and the **portals** that penetrate them are of great importance.

There will always be issues and images that overlap. An example of this is the image of the child and childhood. The innocence and wonder of childhood are one manifestation of a sense of divine connection. The lack of knowledge and experience of children leads to confusion and a lack of stability that can be described as childishness. The child is a natural corollary of maternity which is in itself an important aspect of femininity. Children also epitomize the concepts of vulnerability and of lack of confidence. The image of the child is therefore common in almost every part of the story

and any particular manifestation of the child or childishness is likely to carry several references.

To find a way of arranging things perfectly will never be feasible, however, too much repetition becomes confusing. I have therefore numbered each section and used cross reference to indicate how they might be linked.

The full arrangement of symptoms I have used is as follows:

Connection

Divine Connection; Grounding; Communication; Empathy & Clairvoyance; Clarity; Nature; Youth, Beauty, Peace & Love; Benevolence.

Disconnection

Not Belonging; In a Dream; Detachment; The Observer; Drugs; The Past; Isolation; Need To Be Alone.

Indifference

Apathy; Anaesthesia; Lack of Emotion; Selfishness; Cruelty; Despair.

Dispersion

Air & Water; Water; Waves, Circles & Cycles; Thirst & Dryness; Clouds, Balloons & Bubbles; Emptiness & Lack of Substance; Floating & Flying; Music; Space; Travel; Speed & Rushing

Instability

Oversensitivity; Childishness; Splitting; Chaos & Order; Structure.

Extremes

Tallness; Nobility; Strength *Ok* Hardness; Excess; Materialism; Appetite.

Confusion

Contusion of the Senses; Vanishing of Thoughts; Forgetfulness; Confusion of Identity; Transgenic Confusion; Confusion about Time; Confusion about Position; Confusion about Words.

Feminization

Left Sidedness; Motherhood & Pregnancy; Gender Confusion; Sexuality.

Vulnerability

Babies, Children & Animals; Danger & Violence; Rape, Child Abuse & Incest; Anxiety, Fear & Paranoia; Privacy & Secrecy; Trapped.

Flu & Non Specific Infections; Dirt; Shit & Toilets; Insects, Worms & Vermin.

Lack of Confidence

Old, Ugly & Fat; Shame & Humiliation; Self Hatred & Self Harm.

Obstruction of the Senses; Houses; Skin; Touch; Portals; Mouth, Anus & Vagina; Death.
